The three principals must be commended for their dedication who are forced to raise funds and support while looking after the administration of the schools.

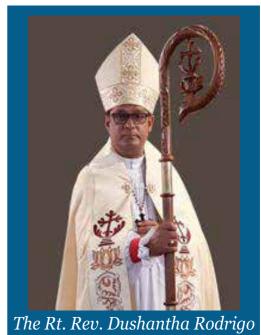

Message from the Chairman, Executive Committee Ceylon School for the Deaf and Blind

On behalf of the Executive Committee of the Ceylon Schools for the Deaf & Blind (CSDB), I am pleased to pen this message for our annual report for the year ending December 31, 2023.

Despite the tremendous difficulties experienced throughout the year, it was a relief to see the country gradually return to a semblance of normalcy. However, this daily life was marred by the severe economic turmoil that gripped the nation.

Regrettably, this turbulent period persisted for a significant duration, causing immense hardship for the people. Thankfully, as the year progressed, the situation began slowly improving, yet the country remained far from the prosperous state it had once enjoyed.

Despite the challenging economic environment, the school functioned efficiently. The principals and staff worked tirelessly to assist help students to make up for lost time.

However, the task of securing funding to ensure the smooth operations of the schools became increasingly difficult. The soaring cost of living had severely reduced the disposable income of the majority of potential donors, making it arduous for them to support charitable institutions like ours with the same vigor as in the past.

While we had to dip into our limited reserves to guarantee the uninterrupted supply of food, medicine, and other essentials, the Resource Development Committee and the Project Coordinator faced an uphill battle in attracting new donors. I am deeply grateful for their unwavering commitment during this challenging period.

It is worth noting that the government provides approximately 30% of our annual expenses. Sourcing the remaining balance has become an increasingly arduous task, particularly as the costs of goods and services continue to rise steeply. However, we are hopeful that the inflationary impact will remain manageable in the coming year.

Alongside the recurrent expenses required to operate the schools, substantial sums are also allocated towards maintaining the aging buildings in Ratmalana and Kaithady. Many of these structures are old and deteriorating, necessitating constant upkeep to mitigate the risks posed to the occupants. These crucial maintenance costs are also covered by our generous donors.

I am deeply grateful to all our donors who, despite the challenges mentioned, have steadfastly continued to support the schools. Whether through donations to fund meals in memory of loved ones, financial contributions towards the children's healthcare needs, or assistance in maintaining our aging facilities to ensure their safety, their generosity has been invaluable.

I would also like to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to the respective principals and staff for their selfless service, year after year, in ensuring the wellbeing of our students. Their unwavering dedication is truly commendable.

We are delighted to welcome Mrs. Nelumnika Perera as the new Principal of our institution. As she takes the helm, we are confident that her dynamic leadership and vision will guide the school to even greater heights of excellence. I wish to place on record our profound gratitude to Dialog Axiata PLC, whose generous support has ensured the smooth and continuous operation of the Ratmalana Audiology Centre (RAC) and the Speech Therapy Center in Kaithady, Jaffna. Their unwavering commitment to these vital facilities has been instrumental in providing essential services to our students.

I would also like to express my heartfelt appreciation to His Lordship the Bishop, who has consistently made himself available to provide guidance and valuable counsel in his capacity as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Report of The Board of Trustees of the Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind 2023

A Legacy of Empowerment

The Board of Trustees of the Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind oversees three distinguished institutions dedicated to providing education, support, and empowerment to the visually and hearing-impaired community. Each institution has a unique history and mission, working in harmony to make a positive impact.



The School for the Deaf and Blind in Ratmalana, founded in 1912 by Miss Mary Chapman of the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society, this school was established to address the needs of individuals who were often neglected by society. Starting with only three teachers, the school now serves approximately 225 students, with about 80% residing on campus. Today, it offers comprehensive education, vocational training, sports, and hostel facilities, supported by a dedicated team of over 100 staff members.

The Nuffield School for the Deaf and Blind in Kaithady, Jaffna, stablished in 1956 in the Jaffna District, the Nuffield School began with 18 students and 4 staff members to meet the educational needs of children in the North. It has since expanded to serve 130 students with a staff of 57. This institution plays a crucial role in providing educational opportunities and fostering inclusivity for the region's differently abled children.





Commitment to Free Education

The Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind, recognized as an approved charity, is committed to offering education, support, and extracurricular activities at no cost to students across all three schools. By eliminating fees for academic and hostel needs, the organization demonstrates its dedication to equal opportunities and breaking down barriers for visually and hearing-impaired students.

A Testament to Compassion and Community

The journey of the Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind highlights the transformative power of education, compassion, and community. From its modest beginnings to its significant impact today, these institutions continue to shape the lives of many visually and hearing-impaired children, standing as beacons of empowerment and inclusivity.

Schools Statistics

In recent years, the schools have faced unprecedented challenges but have successfully adapted to maintain a stable learning environment. The academic year's traditional structure was modified, with the three terms now diverging from their previous format. 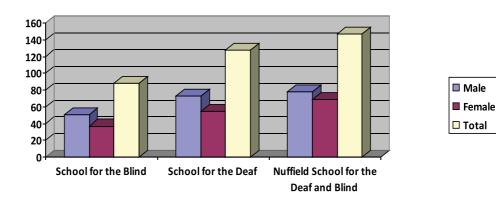

Overall, the year 2023 reflects a triumph of resilience and adaptability, with the schools successfully navigating obstacles and preparing students to achieve their goals with confidence.

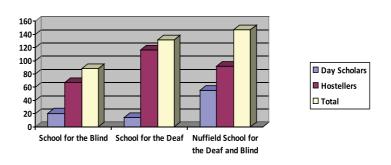
Student Numbers as at December 31st 2023

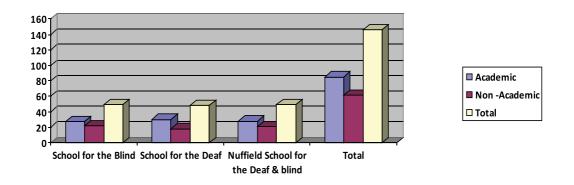
Number of Day Scholar Students and Hostellers

The schools are supported by a government grant that primarily funds Approved teaching staff salaries, complemented by generous donations from individuals and organizations. Financial support is crucial for maintaining the schools' operations and providing comprehensive care to students.

Non-academic staff, which includes, cooks, hostel matrons and masters, caregivers, drivers, gardeners, sanitary workers, and office staff, essential for the schools' effective functioning are not funded by the grant. Donations play a critical role in covering their salaries thereby ensuring their vital contributions are recognized.

The non-academic staff members are integral to creating a supportive environment that enhances students' overall growth and well-being. Their responsibilities, ranging from providing nutritious meals to maintaining the facilities and supporting daily routines, help foster a nurturing atmosphere conducive to both academic and personal development.

Activities and Events of the Schools

Education

The Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind is dedicated to providing education of comparable quality to mainstream schools. The institutions follow a comprehensive curriculum that meets the educational standards of their peers, preparing students for a promising future. They offer education up to the G.C.E. Ordinary Level examination, adhering to Department of Education guidelines.

Students who pass the G.C.E. Ordinary Level examination can proceed to G.C.E. Advanced Level education at various Private and Government schools. Those who do not qualify have the option to either retake the G.C.E. O-Level examination or engage in vocational training, with support for job placements when possible. This approach underscores the schools' commitment to offering meaningful opportunities and ensuring students' continued growth and success.

School for the Blind



The School for the Blind recently launched a Student Exchange Program in collaboration with Bishops College, Ladies College, St. Thomas' College Mount Lavinia, and Hillwood College Kandy. This initiative aimed to promote Inclusive Education and expand learning opportunities for students from both participating schools. The interactions fostered greater awareness and mutual understanding among students. We extend our gratitude to the students and principals of these esteemed schools for their support and participation, which greatly contributed to the program's success.

Efforts were made to enhance Braille literacy skills, crucial for students' success in public exams and integration into society. Teachers conducted extra classes for students needing additional support. Given the challenges with English language skills, special measures were implemented to improve both spoken and written English, supported by volunteer-led activities.

To equip students with essential ICT skills, computer training was introduced, offering new opportunities for accessing information and expanding horizons for the visually impaired.

A motivational workshop was held by the University of Sri Jayawardenapura, featuring two past pupils who inspired current students to overcome motivational challenges.

Significant achievements include a student passing the Grade 5 Scholarship Examination with 143 marks in 2023.

Ten students from the School for the Blind sat for the G.C.E. O/L Examination, with eight successfully advancing to G.C.E. A/L classes at various schools. The School for the Blind Ratmalana was commended by the Ministry of Education for surpassing a 75% pass rate in the 2022 G.C.E. O/L Examination, achieving an 80% pass rate in the Piliyandala Education Zone.

Additionally, five past pupils who entered G.C.E. A/L programs at other schools have continued their education with notable success. Since 2013, 28 out of 32 students from the School for the Blind who pursued G.C.E. A/L have gained admission to various universities. We thank Principal and Staff for all these major achievements.

School for the Deaf

After years of diligent effort and perseverance by both students and teachers, one student from the School for the Deaf successfully passed the G.C.E. Ordinary Level (O/L) examination. This achievement marked a significant milestone in her academic journey and reflected the commitment and hard work invested by all involved.

Despite this success, the student chose not to continue with the G.C.E. Advanced Level (A/L) studies. The extensive syllabus and academic demands of the A/L program presented challenges that she felt were beyond her capacity to manage effectively. Instead, she opted to enroll in the Bakery and Pastry Making Vocational Training class. This decision was motivated by her interest in acquiring practical skills and pursuing a career in this field.

This transition highlights the student's proactive approach in seeking alternative pathways that align with her strengths and interests. It also underscores the importance of providing diverse educational and vocational options to cater to the varied needs and aspirations of students. The School for the Deaf remains committed to supporting all students in finding and pursuing paths that will lead to their personal and professional success.

Nuffield School for the Deaf and Blind

Nine deaf students sat for the Grade 5 Scholarship Examination from the Nuffield School. Out of these, four students achieved scores exceeding 110 marks. Notably, one student scored 144, narrowly missing the scholarship cut-off point of 145. This performance reflects a strong showing by the 2023 Scholarship class, highlighting the students' hard work and the effective preparation provided by their teachers.

The 2022 G.C.E. Ordinary Level (O/L) Examination results were impressive. Of the six students who took the exam for the first time, three achieved eight passes each, while two students secured seven passes. The remaining student obtained five passes. Remarkably, all nine students passed the Tamil Language exam, marking a significant achievement for the Nuffield School for the Deaf and Blind as it was the first time this had been accomplished. This success underscores the students' dedication and the school's commitment to providing high-quality education and support.

Staff Training and Development



The commitment to staff training and development at the institution underscores a deep dedication to enhancing educational services and fostering an environment of continuous improvement. The schools understand that the quality of education and support provided to students is directly influenced by the expertise and effectiveness of their staff. As such, there is a strong emphasis on equipping staff with the necessary skills and knowledge to excel in their roles.

Recognizing the dynamic nature of education, the schools actively encourage staff members to engage in professional development opportunities. These may include workshops, seminars, and training programs designed to update and expand their skills. This proactive approach ensures that educators and support staff are well-versed in the latest teaching methodologies, technologies, and best practices.

By investing in staff development, the institution aims to elevate the standard of teaching and learning. Staff members are supported in their efforts to enhance their professional competencies, which in turn contributes to a more effective and enriching educational experience for students. The emphasis on continuous learning and skill enhancement not only benefits the students but also fosters a culture of excellence and growth within the institution.

Overall, empowering staff through training and development reflects the institution's commitment to providing high-quality education and support. It ensures that both educators and support personnel are equipped to meet the evolving needs of students and contribute positively to their academic and personal growth.

School for the Blind

Academic Staff

- Motivational Workshop: A motivational workshop was conducted by the HR division of Brandix Corporate Campus for all teaching staff. This event was held at their premises and aimed to inspire and rejuvenate the educators.
- Special Needs Education Workshop: Teachers participated in a two-day workshop organized by the Special Needs Education Branch of the Ministry of Education. This training focused on enhancing their skills and knowledge in special education.
- Teacher Training Completion: Mr. Nadun Suraweera returned to the school in December after successfully completing a two-year Special Education Teacher Training program at the Balapitiya Training College, bringing valuable expertise back to the institution.
- Seminars and Workshops: Numerous teachers engaged in various seminars and workshops organized by the Divisional/Zonal Education Office throughout the year, contributing to their professional development.

Hostel Staff

- Medical Awareness Program: A medical awareness program was conducted by Panadura Base Hospital for the hostel staff. This program emphasized the importance of addressing common health issues faced by visually impaired children.
- Medical Course and First Aid Training: The Red Cross Society organized a medical course for the hostel staff, covering essential topics such as first aid, incident management, and the management of wounds and bleeding.
- Para Medical Certification: Miss Irashika Maduwanthi, the Sick Room matron, completed an extended course and obtained a Para Medical Certificate, enhancing her qualifications and ability to provide medical support.
- Special Needs Students Workshop: A workshop focusing on Special Needs Students was conducted for all hostel staff, aiming to improve their understanding and skills in supporting students with special needs.
- English Language Improvement: An English language workshop was held for hostel matrons to enhance their conversational skills. Additionally, a weekly spoken English class was organized to further improve their proficiency.

The School for the Deaf

• Individual Education Plan Workshop: A workshop on the 'Individual Education Plan' was conducted by Mrs. P.L.D. Theja, Deputy Director of Special Education, at the school premises. This session aimed to equip teachers with the skills necessary to develop and implement effective education plans tailored to individual student needs.

- **Art Seminar:** Mr. Roshana Mihiranga participated in an Art Seminar organized by the Piliyandala Zonal Office, focusing on integrating art into special education.
- **Nenasa Special Education Program:** Three teachers attended a one-week special education program titled "Nenasa," organized by the National Institute of Education (NIE). This program was designed to enhance their skills in preparing video lessons in Sign Language.
- **Special Education Circulars Seminar:** Mr. K.A.D. Punyadasa, Director of Non-Formal and Special Education from the Ministry of Education conducted a seminar on "Special Education Circulars" for the teaching staff, providing crucial updates and guidelines on special education policies.
- **Training Completion:** Mrs. Eranga Fernando completed her two-year training at Unawatuna Teachers Training College, furthering her expertise in special education.
- Additional Training: Numerous other training sessions were conducted throughout the year by the Zonal Education Office and the Ministry of Education, covering a range of subjects to support and enhance teachers' professional development.

The Nuffield School the Deaf & Blind

- **Efficiency Bar Examination:** Twelve teachers successfully passed the Efficiency Bar (EB) examination, demonstrating their proficiency and commitment to their professional roles.
- **Sign Language Course:** Twenty staff members participated in a Sign Language course offered by the National Institute of Education (NIE), enhancing their ability to communicate effectively with students.
- **Subject-Oriented Training:** Teachers attended specialized training sessions across various subjects, including Tamil, English, Mathematics, Science, Geography, Health & Nutrition, Art, Christianity, and Agriculture, to deepen their subject knowledge and teaching techniques.
- **National Exam Paper Marking:** Two teachers participated in national exam paper marking sessions, gaining valuable insights into assessment and performance evaluation.
- **Medical Student Program:** Twenty medical students from Jaffna University spent two weeks at the school, contributing to the improvement of teaching and learning through their engagement and expertise.
- **Special Education Diploma:** Three staff members completed their Special Education diploma, furthering their qualifications and expertise in the field.
- **Sign Language Book Development:** Eight staff members collaborated with the National Institute of Education (NIE) and the Social Services Department to develop educational books in Sign Language, enhancing resources for students.
- **Children's Rights Course:** Three staff members attended a course on Children's Rights, broadening their understanding of legal and ethical issues related to student welfare.
- **Teamwork and Leadership Training:** All staff participated in sessions focused on teamwork and leadership, aimed at strengthening collaborative skills and management capabilities.
- **Scouts and Girl Guiding Training:** Staff received training in Scouts and Girl Guiding, expanding their skills in youth development and extracurricular activities.

Vocational Training

In 2023, a diverse range of vocational training programs were offered to students from Grade 6 upwards. These programs aimed to equip students with practical skills required to enhance their career readiness and were designed to provide students with valuable skills that can open various career opportunities and support their personal development.

These vocational programs facilitated their transition into the workforce, highlighting the success of the training initiatives.

School for the Blind

- **Call Center Operation/Customer Experience:** Training focused on developing skills for effective communication and customer service in call center environments.
- **Creative Writing/Writer's Workshop:** A workshop designed to nurture students' writing abilities, fostering creativity and enhancing their literary skills.
- **Computer Repair:** Instruction on diagnosing and repairing computer issues, providing students with technical skills relevant to IT support roles.
- **Braille Writer Repair:** Training on the maintenance and repair of Braille writers, essential for ensuring the functionality of these important tools.
- **Piano Tuning:** Courses on piano tuning techniques, offering students skills for maintaining and restoring pianos.
- **Sewing:** Practical training in sewing, covering techniques for garment creation and repair.
- **Clay Work:** Instruction in clay modeling and pottery, allowing students to explore artistic expression through ceramics.
- IT Classes: Comprehensive classes covering various aspects of information technology, aimed at building foundational and advanced IT skills.

School for the Deaf

Vocational Training takes priority in the School for the Deaf. They offer,



- **Pastry and Bakery Course (TVEC NVQ Level 3):** This course offers students advanced skills in pastry and bakery, certified at NVQ Level 3, enabling them to pursue careers in the culinary field.
- **Graphic Designing Course:** Training in graphic design, focusing on visual communication and creative software, preparing students for roles in digital design and media.
- **Carpentry:** Practical carpentry classes that teach students skills in woodworking and construction, providing foundational knowledge for careers in carpentry and furniture making.
- Hair Cutting & Beauty Culture: A comprehensive course in hair cutting and beauty culture, including the complete refurbishment of the school's beauty culture room by the Girl Guides' Association. This refurbishment, sponsored by the Vineetha Foundation and supported by
- donations of cosmetics from British Cosmetics, helped align the facilities with NVQ Level standards.
- **Sewing:** A six-month sewing project in collaboration with Singer Sri Lanka marked a significant achievement. This initiative enhanced students' skills in garment construction and design, offering practical experience under the guidance of industry professionals.
- **Art:** The newly introduced "Art" vocational training aimed to empower students to create and sell personalized name boards and other artistic products. This initiative focused on developing practical techniques and entrepreneurial skills, enabling participants to generate income through their creative talents.
- **Photography:** Training in photography provided students with skills in capturing and editing images, preparing them for potential careers in visual media.

Employment Outcomes:

- **Hotel Ananthara, Tangalle:** Two students who completed the vocational training courses are now employed at Hotel Ananthara in Tangalle, utilizing their newly acquired skills in a professional setting.
- **Pizza Hut, Moratuwa:** One student has secured employment at Pizza Hut in Moratuwa, applying the skills gained from the training.

The Nuffield School for the Deaf and Blind

For Hearing-Impaired Students:

- **Hospitality:** Training in hospitality, focusing on skills required for roles in the service industry, including customer service, food and beverage management, and hotel operations.
- **Home Science:** Courses in home science that cover various aspects of domestic skills, including cooking, household management, and personal care.
- **Poultry Farming:** Instruction in poultry farming, teaching students about raising and managing poultry, including feeding, health care, and business aspects.
- **Agriculture:** Training in agricultural practices with an emphasis on eco-friendly techniques. This includes hands-on experience with vertical gardens, raised bed gardens, worm farms, rotating compost bins and rainwater harvesting. This approach aims to build vocational skills while providing a solid foundation for students who may pursue academic pathways in the future.
- **Sewing:** Practical training in sewing, covering garment construction, repair, and design.
- **Candle Making:** Courses in candle making, teaching students the art of creating various types of candles and associated business skills.

For Visually Impaired Students:

- **Singing and Music:** Training in singing and music, focusing on developing musical talents and performance skills.
 - Training Schedule and Special Courses:
- **Evening Vocational Training:** Students from Grades 3, 4, and 6-11 attend vocational training lessons in the evenings, ensuring they gain practical skills alongside their regular academic studies.
- **Cookery Course:** Students who took the G.C.E. Ordinary Level exam participated in a three-month cookery course conducted by the Sri Lanka Institute of Tourism and Hotel Management. This course aimed to enhance their culinary skills and prepare them for careers in the food service industry.

The primary focus is on developing agricultural skills aligned with eco-friendly practices. This initiative is designed not only to provide vocational training but also to prepare students for potential academic pathways. By engaging in planning, construction, and maintenance of various sustainable agricultural practices, hearing-impaired students gain valuable hands-on experience that supports both their vocational and academic growth.

Sports

At the schools governed by the Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind, inclusivity and active participation are cornerstones of our educational philosophy. We are dedicated to creating an environment where visually, audibly and hearing impaired children can fully engage in a variety of events alongside their peers. Despite the inherent challenges, our schools are committed to offering diverse opportunities that allow students to showcase their talents and compete in a range of activities.

We emphasize the importance of an inclusive environment that fosters a sense of belonging for all students, by encouraging participation in events alongside their counterparts from other schools. We aim to break down barriers and promote mutual understanding. This approach not only helps our students explore their interests and develop their skills but also cultivates an atmosphere of respect and cooperation within the school community. Through these efforts, we strive to ensure that every student, regardless of their abilities, has the chance to shine and contribute to a vibrant, supportive educational setting.

School for the Blind

- **Cricket Program:** The cricket program was restructured to include practice sessions twice a week, conducted by a dedicated volunteer coach, enhancing the skills and team spirit of the students.
- **Swimming Squad:** Swimming practice is held once a week at the Prince of Wales College Swimming Pool. The program, sponsored by HOPE UK, is led by two certified swimming coaches. The "Learn to Swim" program resumed after a two-year hiatus, providing students with essential swimming skills and competitive opportunities.
- **Chess Classes:** Chess training sessions are conducted twice a week, fostering strategic thinking and concentration among students.
- Athletics: All students participated in the "Sunshine Games," a sports meet for differently abled children organized by the Rotary Club of Colombo Metropolitan. Additionally, the School Sports Meet for 2023, supported by Brandix, showcased students' athletic talents. The students also competed in the Western Province Special Education Sports Meet, where they performed exceptionally well.

School for the Deaf

- Cricket: Cricket practices are ongoing, and the annual "Battle of Silence" cricket tournament between the Ratmalana School for the Deaf and Nuffield School for the Deaf and Blind in Kaithady, Jaffna, took place in October. The School for the Deaf emerged as the champions of this prestigious event.
- Swimming: Regular swimming lessons are conducted every Tuesday and Thursday, providing consistent training and skill development.
- **Netball:** Netball practice sessions are held twice a week, promoting teamwork and physical fitness.
- **Athletics:** Students participated in various athletics meets for differently abled individuals at interschool, district, and national levels, demonstrating their athletic prowess and competitive spirit.

Nuffield School for the Deaf and Blind

- **Athletics:** In March 2023, the annual Inter-House Sports Meet took place, showcasing the talents and competitive spirit of our students. The event featured a range of sports, including volleyball,
 - football, netball, and cricket, as well as track events such as the 60m, 80m, 100m, and 200m sprints, and relay races (4x100m and 4x400m). The meet was a vibrant display of athleticism and team spirit, with students earning prizes and certificates to celebrate their achievements and victories.
- **Cricket:** In October 2023, the Nuffield School cricket team traveled to Colombo for a friendly match against the Ratmalana School for the Deaf. This engaging fixture provided an opportunity for students to



compete in a supportive and spirited environment, strengthening inter-school relationships and

fostering a love for the sport.

Extra-Curricular and Other Activities and Achievements

Extra-curricular activities play a crucial role in the holistic development of students. They offer valuable opportunities beyond the academic curriculum to enhance personal growth, social skills, and overall wellbeing. It develops a diverse set of skills, including leadership, teamwork, communication, and problem-solving. These activities provide a break from academic routines and allow students to explore their interests and passions. Engaging in group activities fosters social interaction, helping students build friendships, learn to work collaboratively, and develop empathy and respect for others. It encourages students to step out of their comfort zones, take on new challenges, and build self-confidence. They provide a platform for students to discover their strengths and areas for improvement. Physical activities, such as sports and dance, promote physical health and well-being. They also help reduce stress and improve mental health by providing a constructive outlet for energy and emotions.

Extra-curricular activities are integral to a well-rounded education, contributing significantly to students' personal and social development, academic performance, and overall life skills.

School for the Blind

- **All-Island Music Competition:** Shanya Kaumini of Grade 6 excelled in the All-Island Music Competition organized by the Ministry of Education, securing 1st place in the Western Province and 4th place at the all-island level.
- **Independence Day Celebrations:** Six students proudly participated in singing the National Anthem during the 75th Independence Day celebrations.
- **Concert Participation:** The Girl Guides took part in the concert "I Do It My Way," organized by the Differently Able Arm of the Guides at the Cinnamon Grand Hotel, highlighting their talents and dedication.

School for the Deaf

School for the Blind

Schools Health, Welfare, Infrastructure Development & Maintenance

Health and Welfare

The School for the Deaf has undertaken significant initiatives to enhance the living conditions and facilities within its hostels, focusing on creating a safe and comfortable environment for students. These improvements are designed to ensure the well-being and health of the students, and several key initiatives have been implemented to support this goal.

School for the Blind

- Health and Dental Checkups: Regular health and dental inspections were conducted by the staff
 of the University Hospital of the Kotelawala Defense University, ensuring ongoing medical care and
 monitoring.
- **Medical Health Camp:** A comprehensive medical health camp was organized under the supervision of physicians from the Ministry of Health, providing essential health services and screenings for students.
- **Sexual Education Awareness Program:** In collaboration with the Save the Children Foundation, an awareness program on sexual education was held for students, academic staff, and hostel staff.
- Educational and Recreational Outings:
 - ✓ Primary school children were taken on excursions to Mount Lavinia Beach, Vihara Maha Devi Park, and the Zoo, offering them enriching and enjoyable experiences.
 - ✓ Students from Grades 6-9 attended a movie screening of *Gajaman*, providing an immersive audio experience and introducing them to the dynamics of film.
 - ✓ Grades 10 and 11 students visited the Gannoruwa Agriculture Centre, gaining practical insights into agricultural practices.
 - ✓ Post Ordinary Level 2022 students enjoyed a celebratory day tour to Wiluda Wila, where they participated in a leadership workshop and engaging activities, marking the completion of their exams with a focus on leadership and personal growth.

School for the Deaf

Improvements have been made to the hostels and general living conditions for students to ensure a more supportive and comfortable environment. These enhancements aim to create a conducive atmosphere for both academic and personal development.

To further support the health and well-being of students, several initiatives have been introduced.

• **Health and Fitness Programs:** A dedicated 2-hour Physical Education program was conducted for Grades 9 and 10 by lecturers and students from Jayewardenepura University. Nuffield School's commitment to the holistic well-being of its students is evident through various support services and improvements.

- **Comprehensive Healthcare:** Students at Nuffield School, who come from diverse regions across Sri Lanka, benefit from extensive health care provided by the Jaffna Teaching Hospital. This includes essential services such as ear and eye examinations, dental care, skin treatments, and medical attention for any other health issues that may arise throughout the year.
- **Mental and Emotional Support:** A dedicated counselor is available to address the mental and emotional well-being of the students. This support is crucial for helping students manage stress, build resilience, and maintain a positive outlook.

- **Speech Therapy:** The school employs two Speech Therapists and two Speech Therapy Assistants who play a pivotal role in helping hearing-impaired students develop communication skills. Their work supports the integration of these students into broader society by enhancing their ability to interact effectively and confidently.
- **Supportive Environment:** The school ensures that urgent needs are met promptly and strives to create a nurturing home-like environment. Regular outings and activities are organized to support students' mental and emotional health, providing them with enriching experiences outside the classroom.



These initiatives collectively contribute to fostering a supportive and enriching environment that addresses both the physical and emotional needs of the students.

Infrastructure Development & Maintenance

Despite financial constraints, the schools undertook substantial infrastructure development projects aimed at significantly enhancing facilities and amenities. These initiatives were designed to create a more conducive and supportive learning environment for students, reflecting the schools' commitment to improving educational experiences and outcomes.

School for the Blind

- **Senior Boys and Intermediate Boys Hostels:** Repair work was conducted with the support of a donor and a team of Navy personnel.
- **Electrical System Renovation:** The electricity systems of the Senior Boys Hostel and Junior Boys Hostel, along with the Borupana Roadside fence and office wall color wash, were renovated by the Sri Lankan Navy and a sponsor.
- **Senior Girls Washroom:** The renovations of the roofing and color washing of the bathing rooms were completed by Maliban Biscuits Pvt. Ltd.
- Hostel Dining Room: Repairs and painting was completed by Maliban Biscuits Pvt. Ltd.

The following report offers a detailed account of the financial performance, fundraising initiatives, and meal donations program at the Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind for the year 2023. This comprehensive overview underscores the institution's unwavering commitment to the well-being and education of its students, even in the face of challenging circumstances. Financial Analysis

The annual financial statement for 2023 provides an in-depth examination of the institution's financial health. The total income for the year amounted to Rs. 251,730,803/-, while total expenditure reached Rs. 260,019,007/-. This resulted in a deficit of Rs. 8,288,204/-, reflecting the ongoing challenges in balancing resources with the growing needs of the institution.

The budget for the year projected an income of Rs. 179,588,485/- and expenditure of Rs. 179,406,422/-. While the actual income exceeded the budgeted figure by Rs. 72,142,318/-, the expenditure also surpassed the budgeted amount by Rs. 80,612,585/-. This variance highlights both the institution's ability to secure additional funding and the increased costs incurred over the year.

These financial figures illustrate the institution's commitment to expanding and enhancing its services despite the financial pressures. The analysis indicates a proactive approach to managing finances, with efforts to address the shortfall through strategic budgeting, fundraising activities, and cost control measures. Moving forward, the institution will continue to focus on optimizing its financial strategies to ensure sustained support for its mission and objectives.

Fundraising Efforts and Meal Donations and Sponsor a Child Program

Amidst a challenging economic climate, the Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind received steadfast support from its dedicated donors and well-wishers. Despite the absence of major fundraising events, the unwavering commitment of the school's supporters ensured the institution's continued progress and stability throughout the year. Expenditure for the Ratmalana Schools were, Rs. 27,139,990/- and Rs. 14,962,325/- was the expenditure for the Nuffield School for the Deaf and Blind.

The year 2023 was marked by resilience, determination, and community support for the Ceylon School for the Deaf & Blind. Despite financial constraints and logistical challenges, the institution persevered in its mission to provide quality education and care to its students. As we move forward, we remain committed to our cause, fueled by the generosity and compassion of our supporters.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended 31 December 2023,

1. REPORTING ENTITY

1.1 Domicile and legal form

The Board Office of the Board of Trustees of Ceylon School for the Deaf and Blind (the "Board Office") has the registered office of the Board Office is located at No. 521, Galle Road, Ratmalana.

1.2 Principal activities and nature of operations

The principal activity of the Board Office, manage the Branches/Schools:

- 1. The School for the Deaf at Ratmalana
- 2. The School for the Blind at Ratmalana
- 3. Nuffield School for the Deaf and Blind at Kithadi

The aim of the Board Office is to manage the three schools by way of fund raising, coordinating the requirements of the schools and controlling the finances including that of the schools. The Board Office also manages the distribution of the finances of the three schools considering their needs and requirements.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards for Small and Medium Sized Entities ("SLFRS for SMEs").

2.2 Going concern

The Trustees have made an assessment of the Board Office's ability to continue as a going concern and they do not intend either to liquidate or to cease trading.

2.3 Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis. No adjustments have been made for inflationary factors in the financial statements.

2.4 Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees (LKR) which is the Board Office's functional and presentation currency.

2.5 Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards for Small and Medium Sized Entities ("SLFRS for SMEs") requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Judgments and estimates are based on experience and other factors including expectations that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Hence actual experience and results may differ from these judgments and estimates.

3. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

3.1 Assets and bases of their valuation

Assets classified as current assets on the statement of financial position is bank balances and receivables, and those assets which are expected to be realized in cash during the normal operating cycle or within one year from the reporting date.

3.1 Assets and bases of their valuation (Continued)

3.1.1 Property, plant and equipment

3.1.1.1 Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the following;

Cost of materials and direct labour;

Any other costs directly attributable to bringing the assets to a working condition for management intended use;

When parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment and depreciated separately.

An item of property and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use. Profits or losses on disposal of an item of property and equipment are determined by comparing the proceeds from its disposal with its carrying amount, and recognised net within income and expenditure.

3.1.1.2 Subsequent expenditure and replacement

Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Board Office.

3.1.1.3 Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of items of property and equipment less their estimated residual values using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives, and is recognised in income and expenditure.

The estimated useful lives for the current periods is as follows:

A full year's depreciation is provided in the year of purchase, whereas no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal.

3.1.1.4 Basic financial instruments

The Board Office recognizes all financial instruments under basic financial instruments in accordance Sri Lanka Accounting Standards for Small and Medium Sized Entities ("SLFRS for SMEs"). Basic financial instrument are measured at fair value at initially and subsequently at fair value or amortized cost. The gain or losses from fair value is recognized in income and expenditure during the period.

3.1.2 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash in hand and bank.

The cash flow statement has been prepared using the indirect method. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents consists of deposits at banks net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

3.1.3 Other assets

Other assets are stated in the financial statements at their estimated realizable value.

3.2 Funds

3.2.1. Unrestricted Funds

Unrestricted funds are those that are available for use by the organisation at the discretion of the Board, in furtherance of the general objectives of the organisation and which are not designated for any specific purpose.

3.2.2. Restricted Funds

Where grants are received for use in an identified project or activity, such funds are held in a restricted fund account and transferred to the statement of income and expenditure to match with expenses incurred in respect of that identified project. Unutilized funds are held in their respective Fund accounts and included under accumulated fund in the statement of financial position until such time as they are required.

3.3 Liabilities and provisions

All material liabilities as at the reporting date have been included in the financial statements and adequate provisions have been made for liabilities which are known to exist but the amount of which cannot be determined accurately.

Liabilities classified as current liabilities in the statement of financial position are those which will fall due for payment on demand or within one year from the reporting date. Items classified as long term liabilities will be due for payment one year from the reporting date.

3.3.1 Employee benefits

3.3.1.1 Defined benefit plans

Provision for retirement gratuity has been made for employees who have completed more than one year of service with the Board Office. However, under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, the liability for gratuity arises only on completion of five years continued service.

3.3.1.2 Defined contribution plans

Obligations to defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the income statement as incurred. The Board Office contributes 12% and 3% of gross emoluments of employees as Provident Fund and Trust Fund contribution respectively.

3.3.2 Provisions

Provisions are made for all obligations existing as at the reporting date when it is possible that such an obligation will result in an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the quantum of the outflow.

3.4 Statement of income and expenditure

3.4.1 Income recognition

Donations are recognized on cash basis. The board office receives cash as part of the voluntary donations. The board office has established internal controls to record all voluntary donations. Regular and adhoc donations and contributions are recognized when it is certain that the donation is made available for the benefit of the board office.

3.4.2 Interest income

Interest income is accounted for in the period in which it relates.

3.4.3 Other income

Other Income is recognized on an accrual basis.

3.4.4 Expenditure recognition

3.4.4.1 Revenue expenditure

The surplus earned by the Board Office as shown in the statement of income and expenditure is after providing for all known liabilities and for depreciation of property, plant and equipment. For the purpose of presentation of statement of income and expenditure, the directors are of the opinion that the function of expenses method present fairly the elements of the enterprise's performance, hence such presentation method is adopted.

3.4.4.2 Capital expenditure

Expenditure incurred for the purpose of extending or improving assets of a permanent nature by means to carry on the business or for the purpose of increasing the earning capacity of the business has been treated as capital expenditure.

3.4.4.3 Current income tax

The Board Office is exempted from income tax as stipulated under Section 9 of the Inland Revenue Act, No. 24 of 2017 is an approved charity declared by Minister by notice published in 1952 by Gazette No. 10,411. As stated there, the interest derived by a charitable institution, where it is proved to the satisfaction of the Commissioner-General that such interest is applied solely for the purpose of providing care to children, the elderly or the disabled in a home maintained by such charitable institution; is exempted.

3.5 Foreign currency transaction

All monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the reporting date have been translated into Sri Lankan Rupees (LKR), at the rates of exchange prevailing at the reporting date while non-monetary assets and liabilities which are carried in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the exchange rate that prevailed at the date of transaction. Foreign currency differences arising on translation are recognized in income and expenditure.

All foreign currency transactions are converted to Sri Lankan Rupees (LKR), at the rates of exchange applicable on the dates of the transactions.

3.6 Events occurring after the reporting date

All material post reporting date events have been considered and where appropriate, adjustments or disclosures have been made in the respective notes to the financial statements.

3.7 Commitments and contingencies

All material capital commitments and contingent liabilities of the Board Office are disclosed in the respective notes to the financial statements.
